

#### NAPLAN RESULTS COULD BE GOODER, GOVERNMENT CONCEDES



The Federal Government admits literacy and numeracy skills should of improved fasterer, following fifteeen years of NAPLAN testing. Results from this year's test, released Wednesday, show a 2.04% decline in riting skills. Reading has declined too, with many children now unable to maintain the necessary concentration to read to the end of a Grammar results has also gone backwards since the knew testing was introduced in 2007. Encouragingly, numeracy levels have actually improved over the last ten years, up by around a third (11%).



New Premium Qantas Service to Include Flight
National carrier Qantas has announced a special
new top-end fare that will allow customers to enjoy
a flight on an aeroplane with every flight purchased.
It represents a step-up from standard Qantas fares,
which include a flight confirmation email, but not
the flight itself.

CEO Alan Joyce said as the premium carrier in the market, Qantas was always looking for new ways to delight its customers. "We thought about different ways we can add value to the Qantas experience – a free snack, an extra luggage allowance – and then we had this idea of including an airline flight. It was quite a breakthrough moment," he said.

Customer services manager Elise Samadas said the new service was the result of extensive research. "We asked customers what they really want out of a flight, and being flown to their destination was right up at the top of the list, which surprised us," she said.

Joyce said they were well set up to offer the service, given they already had aeroplanes. "I've always wondered why we had all of these aeroplanes, and now it just seems to make so much sense," he said. The new 'Flying-Class' fares will come at a premium cost, to reflect the extra service. Customers can choose to upgrade further, by having their baggage flown to the same destination as them.

### THERE'S THE BELL TOWER, PERTH'S LEAST POPULAR LANDMARK

The Swan Bell Tower is one of Perth's more bemusing icons, namely in that no one could ever figure out why they needed it in the first place.

The tower was the passion project of past WA premier Richard Court, built in 1999 to mark the new millennium. It's home to twelve of the St-Martins-in-the-Fields bells. These were originally housed in the St-Martins-in-the-Fields Church (what a mouthful), in Trafalgar Square, London.

SMINF's received a sparkling new set of bells in 1988 and gifted their old bells to the City of Perth. So, they're essentially hand me downs to begin with.

It was architect William Hames who came up with the glass tower and copper sails design. This was intended to reflect the Swan River, which the tower would sit beside. The strange design of the tower was never popular. Plus, the total price tag was \$5.5 million AUD, a staggering amount of money at the time, which many thought could be better spent elsewhere.

It's certainly one of the stranger landmarks to be found in the area, but there are a couple of others just as baffling.

### MANDURAU GIANTS TRIP


#### Interesting bit for English lovers -Absolutely brilliant!
